

DESTINATION SPOTLIGHT

Dungk Lvngpik Cave

Explore the natural wonders of caves located in Aying Village. Just a scenic 12km drive followed by an invigorating hour-long trek transports you to these hidden caves.

These two distinct caves, each with its own unique charm. The first cave boasts an entrance standing tall at 2 meters with a width spanning 3 to 4 meters. Venture inside to be greeted by soaring heights ranging from 10 to 15 meters, creating an awe-inspiring atmosphere.

Adjacent lies the second cave, a mere 15 to 20 meters away. Its entrance dwarfs the first, reaching heights of 8 to 10 meters while maintaining a



slender breadth of 1 to 2 feet. Once inside, marvel at the cave's oval shape, spanning approximately 10 to 12 meters in diameter.

These caves are not only marvels of nature but also hold rich historical significance. During ancient times, they served as shelters for local hunters, offering refuge as they pursued hunting wild animals and bat traps.

Embark on a journey through time and nature as you explore these naturally formed wonders in Nacho.

Siam Tulip


