Dechenthang Village




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Dechenthang village is home to Memba tribe, known for their warm hospitality and traditional customs. Visitors can immerse themselves in the local culture witnessing folk dances, savouring local delicacies and even participating in their traditional festivals. The traditional houses, built with wood and stone, reflect the architectural style unique to this region.



Dechenthang also has its spiritual significance. The village is dotted with several ancient Mani stones, Stupas and prayer flags fluttering in the wind, lending colour to its air. These offer a glimpse into the spiritual life of the villagers.




Stone stacks filled with prayers inscribed on stones in a language akin to Sanskrit, believed to date back over 600 years, as recounted by the local inhabitants.

Once across, turn left and continue while you pass through the Durigyap Village, Mechukha Village and Galling. Then, proceed to Dechenthang Village. 


Samten Yangchag Monastery: 7.8km Mechukha Adventure Park: 11km Pema Shelpu: 17km Hanuman Face: 18km

Dev Balu's Dzong/Fort



In close proximity to Mechukha lie the remnants of the Memba tribe, which once fell under the jurisdiction of Tibetan kings who implemented the "Dev System" for governance. These remnants include Dev Balu's Dzong, where "Dev" signifies the title bestowed upon the leader or governor of the Memba Community, and "Dzong" denotes a fort. The fort's appellation honors Balu, the inaugural Dev of the Memba community. Here, visitors can explore the architecture of the fort while learning about its significance.





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
